Message from the Director

This newsletter marks the beginning of the second decade of the ISI and I welcome all of you to share in the joy of what has been and the anticipation for what is to come. In this issue you will read reflections on their first year by our new interns, and be introduced to our incoming class (the eleventh one) through their biographical sketches; our next edition will be devoted to the class of 2013.

In looking back over the last ten years of the ISI's existence, I am amazed by two things: the robust community that continues to exist among those who have been through the program, and the outreach members make to countless individuals and communities throughout Northeast Ohio. The two are linked: through communal sharing of their faith and lives, ISI folks find the necessary foundation and inspiration for their outreach to others.

I recently read these encouraging words of Chiara Lubich, founder of the Focolare Movement, which seem to bespeak what continues to happen in the ISI:

Two or more people fused in the name of Christ, who are not afraid or ashamed to declare explicitly to one another their desire to love God, but who actually make of this unity in Christ their Ideal, are a divine power in the world.... It is not necessary for them to be saints already, or Jesus would have said so. It is enough for them to be united in the name of Christ and that they never go back on this unity. Naturally, they will not remain two or three for very long, for charity spreads of itself and grows by enormous proportions. Every small cell, set alight by God in any point of the earth, will necessarily spread, and Providence will distribute these flames, these souls on fire, wherever it thinks fit, so that the world in many places may be restored to the warmth of the love of God, and hope again (Chiara Lubich, *Essential Writings*).

This sounds very like what Ignatius meant when he told his followers to go out and set the world on fire. It seems that, in the Ignatian spirit, this is happening in our little corner of the world in Northeast Ohio. May the adventure continue!

Though our denominational affiliations may be diverse, our common unity is found in Christ. This unity in Christ is truly our home. Though we have used the image of the journey in describing the ISI, the image of home is equally appropriate. Many students say that when they find the ISI they feel they have "come home." One of my favorite scripture passages is John 8:31-32, in the Jerusalem Bible's translation: "If you make my word your home, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." This "word" means the words of scripture; in the ISI, in true Ignatian fashion, we spend time living with and in scriptural stories, allowing them to inform our lives. But it also means the Word of God, incarnate in Jesus, in whom indeed we live and move and have our being, and who lives

and moves and has his being in us. Our source of unity is truly in him.

This makes what we do as ministry a very human enterprise, because as Paul reminds us, "we have this treasure [Christ] in earthen vessels" (2 Cor 4:7). As Chiara Lubich says, we do not have to be saints. And, as the poet Mary Oliver reminds us, "You do not have to be good./ You do not have to walk on your knees/ For a hundred miles through the desert, repenting./ You only have to let the soft animal of your body love what it loves" ("Wild Geese"). And remember, it was in an earthen vessel with all its strengths and weaknesses, joys and sorrows, hopes and disappointments, flourishing and suffering, that our brother Jesus, Incarnate Word who is our home, was pleased to dwell.

A sign at a local church sums up my first year experience: "God doesn't call the equipped. He equips the called." I couldn't be sure if I was called. But I knew for sure I wasn't equipped. My classmates were a different story. Most had not only heard the bell, but trained for the fight. They were a loving community, more saintly than sinful, many of whom held a license to preach. I wondered how God let a personal injury lawyer like me slip into class. True, my trial skills help with the mechanics of being a spiritual director. I know how to ask a question—even open ended "evocative" ones. I know the art of the head bob like a sideline reporter for ESPN. Just be interested (which I am), nod and listen to the spiritual story unfold. But understanding the content of the class was something else. The federal tax code seemed easier to grasp than the theological musings of Karl Rahner. There, my equipment was sorely lacking. And yet I just put one foot in front of the other, and tried to find God in all things, even ISI. Even when I felt I was in the wrong place at the wrong time, struggling to make sense of it, the great divine mystery nudged at me and assured me our director Joan Nuth was right. We really do learn what we're supposed to learn. And maybe I was where I was supposed to be-being fitted with new equipment for the spiritual journey, one we all take in our own way and at our own pace. I came to see that my doubts and fears and struggles with my faith were no longer something to hide behind, but the very things God uses to equip us for the call. Most of all, I learned that God didn't just call it quits after seven days. He is a continuous creator still tangibly at work right here, right now, in present tense in each of us. In spiritual direction, I am given a back stage pass to watch another's spiritual evolution unfold, where I can see in them, far more than me, yet another Exhibit A—proof that God not only exists, but is alive and well. <u>Tuition</u>

Tuition is billed directly from and payable to the ISI Office.
